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New police station



In June, the Cessnock community received news that has been more than a decade in the making. After years of advocacy from our community, a new state-of-the-art police station will be built to meet the current and future needs of our growing population. This is a tremendous win for our community.

I was pleased to be invited by the Minister for Police, Troy Grant, to join him to announce the construction of the \$13.5 million station. The Minister was in agreement with me that community safety should be the key priority of every government and a new police station will ensure our local officers can continue to keep our community safe with new and improved resources.

During the 2018/19 financial year, \$1.15 million will be spent on the design of the station, geotechnical and preliminary works. I have been informed by the Minister that construction is expected to commence around July 2019.

During construction, some police officers will remain on-site in temporary accommodation while others look likely to be working out of the Kurri Kurri Police Station. Construction is expected to take approximately 18 months.

The new station will also increase the police presence across Cessnock, Kurri Kurri, Wollombi, Branxton and Greta. I know this will be a welcomed development by local residents who have expressed their concern about criminal and anti-social behaviour in recent years.

Funding for local sport

Eight local sporting groups from across the Cessnock Electorate will be in a better position to encourage people to participate in sport thanks to funding under the Local Sport Grant Program.

SUCCESSFUL GROUPS:

- Abermain Rams Football Club secured \$2,872 to purchase uniforms and equipment.
- Abermain Weston Hawks RLFC secured \$5,000 to subsidise registration fees.
- Cessnock Amateur Swimming Club secured \$3,000 to fund a swim program and subsidise costs.
- Greta Workers Sports and Recreation Club secured \$20,000 to install an irrigation system.
- Kurri Kurri Junior Motorcycle Club secured \$5,000 to purchase a tractor.
- Kurri Kurri Netball Association secured \$5,000 to purchase heavy duty marquees.
- Kurri Kurri Tennis Club secured \$7,128 to upgrade lighting at their courts.
- West Wallsend Soccer Club secured \$2,000 to allow coaches to complete development courses.

We are forced to pay for the stadiums

Since my election in 2011, there has not been an issue that has created such a sustained level of outrage in the community as the Berejiklian Government's decision to knock down and rebuild the Sydney Football Stadium and redevelop Stadium Australia at a cost of \$2.3 billion.

In the 2018/19 Budget, the Berejiklian Government directed each of their agencies to reduce their spending by three per cent over the next four years. That means more cuts to our essential public services like schools, hospitals, police, roads and transport.

The Berejiklian Government refused to explain the reason behind the decision to impose a three per cent cut on our essential services but the Budget papers clearly illustrate their reasoning. The Berejiklian Government needs an additional \$1.6 billion to meet their stadium strategy. The three per cent saving across each of the agencies totals \$1.6 billion.



We can expect the cuts to be made to jobs, building maintenance, replacing faulty equipment, keeping information up to date, responding to enquiries from the community and providing an overall efficient service.

Unfortunately, the Berejiklian Government believes it is appropriate for money to be directed towards the knock-down and rebuild of two stadiums in Sydney, that will be empty most of the year, rather than addressing the lower levels of service in the community. As we wait for our delayed buses, packed emergency rooms and decrepit police stations, the Government's attention will be focused on the construction taking place at Moore Park and Sydney Olympic Park.

A new entrance for the jail is needed

The expansion of the Cessnock Correctional Centre has caused many concerns for local residents. However, one of the most pressing issues has been the access road leading to the site. Over the last 18 months there have been far too few consultations with the community about the entrance. This means that the Berejiklian Government is still refusing to make a decision, which is leaving our community in limbo.

In recent months, Corrective Services NSW have released three preferred options for the access road that all impact on residential streets. This has caused significant concern for local residents who have directly expressed their concerns to me, Cessnock City Council and Corrective Services NSW.

It appears in the short-term, Corrective Services NSW have repealed their intention to use local residential streets. I will continue to liaise with them to investigate the benefits of using State funded roads as an access point to the site.

Sign the petition to save our bees



Amateur beekeepers play a vital role in defending our environment and ecosystem against parasites, invasive species and diseases that threaten bees and each of the crops they pollinate.

Without our amateur beekeepers and their hives, our biodiversity will be at a real risk of irreparable damage.

I am currently collecting signatures on a petition calling on the Berejiklian Government to support amateur beekeepers by allocating more resources to help them in pursuing their hobby.

Return and Earn



Return and Earn machines have been out in the community for a year now. Despite initial problems, they seem to be working well.

I have always been a supporter of a container deposit scheme and it appears local residents have shown resilience despite ongoing problems with the program and are now using the machines. There certainly seems to be a reduction in the number of plastic bottles being dumped in our streets and in our kerbs. It is great to witness the community working together for the betterment of the environment.

Progress of Kurri Ambulance Station

It has been more than 12 months since Kurri Kurri Ambulance Station was damaged during a weather event that impacted the local area. Following its closure, the Minister for Health informed the local community that repairs would be finalised by the end of this year.

Despite this commitment, we have since been told to expect the building to be closed until at least March 2019.

The Minister claims the delays have been due to building compliance issues.

I understand repairs to the station will include replacement of the roof, re-sheeting of all the internal walls, fit-out works, painting, new floor coverings and the replacement of the automatic roller door. These works will certainly bring the station up to modern standards and guarantee that paramedics will be able to continue to provide efficient and outstanding service to the Kurri Kurri community.

Until the repairs have been made the temporary station facilities at Kurri Kurri Hospital will remain operational. Although this arrangement has been frustrating for local residents, I can assure you that the number of ambulances servicing the Kurri Kurri region remains the same.



A fix for Minmi Road congestion

For some time, congestion at the intersection of Main Road and Minmi Road, Edgeworth, has caused headaches for local residents, particularly during peak traffic periods. Repeated attempts to resolve the problem have failed and congestion continues to increase at the intersection.


Since the opening of the Hunter Expressway in 2014, traffic using the Minimi and Main Roads intersection has drastically increased. Despite significant improvements by Lake Macquarie City Council, the level of daily traffic using Minmi Road continues to grow.

Along with the Shadow Minister for Roads, Maritime and Freight, I have met with concerned local residents who expressed their belief that if improvements are not made, including the relocation of the bus stop from Minmi Road to Hunter Life Education land, then someone will be seriously injured or killed.

I have been working closely with the Department of Education and Hunter Life Education and I am hoping a resolution will emerge in the coming months.



Calling for a school at Cameron Park



As the population of Cameron Park and surrounding areas continues to grow, there are increasing calls for the construction of a new primary school in Cameron Park.

The Department of Education currently owns two sites at Cameron Park that have been identified as possible locations for a new primary school. One property is along Jupiter Circuit and the other is on Wallsend Road.

Despite figures showing that three local primary schools are at capacity, the NSW Government is refusing to select a site and begin construction. This is causing stress for local families.

Our firefighters put their lives in danger on a regular basis to keep our community safe and I always welcome any investment into our local brigades that ensures they have the resources and equipment to continue their important job. Unregistered dirt bikes Inspiring others



A common problem suffered by residents across the Cessnock Electorate is unregistered dirt bikes speeding along local streets throughout the day and night. Following calls from our community, the police have responded in force taking over 50 unregistered dirt bikes off our streets.

Officers from the Hunter Valley Police District and the Lake Macquarie Police District have been proactive in recent months targeting unregistered dirt bikes on our local roads.

In many cases those riding unregistered dirt bikes do not have helmets or safety gear and are often up to no good. The dirt bikes are used to run drugs, ignore the rules of our land and to assist in all types of other criminal activity.

Those not obeying the law should not be confused with the law-abiding hobby riders who wear helmets and safety gear.

Digging up the dead

In the last sitting weeks of Parliament, the Berejiklian Government used its numbers to confirm their proposal to allow cemeteries to dig up human remains and re-sell the burial plot to other people after 25 years. This plan will impose horrible choices on many families.

Under this proposal, the Government will force grieving families to choose from two classes of burials – perpetual monuments for those who can afford it, while everyone else will be encouraged to "rent" the resting place of families and loved ones for approximately 25 years.

There are concerns that these changes will allow cemetery operators to increase the price of perpetual graves and profit from people's natural reluctance for limited tenure.

The Government claims the rationale behind this decision was because of the growing population of NSW. Rather than finding new cemetery space, the Government thinks the best decision is to dig up the remains of loved ones.

Despite many groups and organisations, including churches, cemetery operators and community groups, pleading with the Government to not go ahead with their proposal, they have adopted a crash or crash through approach.

Remembering 20 lost diggers



During the Centenary of Anzac, local communities have come together to remember those men and women who bravely served our country during World War I. Recently, the Kearsley Community Dawn Service Committee held a special ceremony to honour 20 local men who had served during World War I but had received no public recognition of their service.

Earlier this year, the Committee uncovered the identities of the men who had lived and worked in the small villages of Kearsley, Edenville and Abernethy before enlisting and travelling to Gallipoli and the Western

During the remembrance ceremony, the Governor of NSW, His Excellency General The Honourable David Hurley AC DSC (Ret'd) unveiled 20 memorial plaques to commemorate the service and sacrifice of each of the récovered soldiers, which are located in the Kearsley Remembrance Garden that has been established by the Committee to honour local service personnel.

It was an honour to attend the ceremony and see first-hand the impact the discovery of these 20 young men has had on the communities of Kearsley and Abernethy. By providing a local connection to the courage and bravery demonstrated by Australians during World War I, the Committee has ensured that future generations will continue to reflect on the service of these local men. This is a wonderful example of a community working together to ensure our past is never forgotten.
